With Liberty and Justice for All from Beata Abraham



It may not be a surprise to you that the role of Jews in the quest for American independence in 1776 is a story you won't find in history or textbooks without a good search. But in spite of Jewish Americans being a relatively small minority

in the colonies at the time, their contributions to the fight for freedom were abundant, remarkable, and an integral part of the diverse tapestry of individuals who sought freedom from British rule. So don't be modest, this Fourth of July is a perfect opportunity to spread the word about the role of Jewish colonialists in the war for independence.

Among the several notable superstar Jewish Americans during the Revolutionary War was Haym Salomon. Salomon, a Polish-born immigrant, played a pivotal role in financing the American cause. He was a shrewd financier and broker who contributed greatly to fund the Continental Army and

the revolutionary government at a time when colonial finances were precariously depleted. Salomon's efforts were key in securing loans from foreign governments, particularly from France, which was crucial to bolstering and sustaining the war effort. His financial acumen and unwavering eagerness to support the cause of independence with his own personal resources earned him the cumbersomely fitting nickname "The Financial Hero of the American Revolution."

Of course, Jewish support in the fight

for freedom was not strictly financial. Several Jewish Americans served in various capacities within the Continental Army. Facing discrimination and suspicion due to their religion, many Jews still chose to enlist in the military to fight alongside their fellow Americans. One such example is Colonel Isaac Franks, who served as an aide-de-camp to General George Washington during the war. Franks was just one shining example of the remarkable contributions by Jewish Americans on the battlefield of freedom.

On the home front, Jewish communities across the colonies staunchly took up support for the revolutionary cause in their own synagogues. We can only imagine the impassioned sermons being delivered by rabbis from colonial *bimot* championing the

> cause for independence to their congregations. Jewish merchants and traders did their part by boycotting British goods and providing material support to the revolutionary effort. Their involvement in the economic and social fabric of colonial society helped to fortify the resilience of the revolution against British oppression.

Despite encountering prejudice, Jewish Americans were steadfast in their commitment to the principles of liberty and self-determination. Their contributions to the cause of American independence encompassed financial support, military service, and community activism. While their stories may not take center stage in accounts of the Revolutionary War, the role of Jewish Americans in shaping the course of American history is a testament to their commitment and contribution to the struggle for freedom.

of Anita Bensman and her baking crew. But it was actually just a dry run for what we're planning this summer....

On Sunday, August 4, at 4 p.m., we will again present Jazz Impressions on "Fiddler on the Roof," but with a twist: we will be

performing ON THE ROOF of CBINT! Don't worry, we'll be above the kitchen, which isn't so high off the ground, and the audience will be seated comfortably in chairs on the grass below.

And there's another twist. More than just a fun concert, we will be promoting the work of the newly relaunched Social Action Committee, with special focus on their work regarding housing. Why housing? "Fiddler on Roof" is set in a time and place when Jews were in many ways marginalized, in particular with regard to the right to own land, which they were denied.

Today in America, Jews as a whole, are highly empowered, with the fortune of having most opportunities, including land ownership, open to us. With this fortune comes the responsibility to stand up for those whose rights – in particular housing – have been systematically and systemically impeded or outright denied, leaving behind a trail of generational wealth disparity. And the spike in antisemitism we have seen in recent years only further motivates me to take up this cause, to show the world – or at least Milwaukee

> County – that we are part of the community and committed to using our voice and status to help make the lives of others better.

I invite you to come and enjoy the concert on August 4, which is free and open to the public, and to talk with the chairs of the

Social Action Committee – Felicia Miller, Don Bass, and Jodie Honigman – about the newest initiatives and how you can offer your support. Until then...

This Fourth of July while you are enjoying a barbeque with friends and family, followed by a spectacular fireworks display, claim your right to be proud of the Jewish role in the fight for American independence. Yes, there remains more work to be done to realize the vision of our forefathers, but if colonial Jews were able to boldly fight for their beliefs in the face of prejudice, we certainly must too.

Social Action Committee: Mitzvah Garden from Karen Rachum

Sunday, May 5, was our inaugural Plant Sale at CBINT during Religious School. We raised over \$300, which is a great amount for maintaining the garden in 2024.

Thank you to Rabbi Alter, Beata Abraham, and Allie Barry for coordinating and allowing me to have the sale. Feedback is encouraged from members regarding offerings at future plant sales.

The Mitzvah Garden has evolved to be selfsufficient in many ways. The abundant quantity of plants grown for the sale intentionally populated the CBINT and Rachum home gardens. Tomatoes, peppers, lettuce are just a few of the home-grown offerings.

Our initiative to provide food for Tikkun Ha-Ir Veggie Chop Shop is based on growing crops that have a long shelf life. Fall-planted garlic will be ready to harvest in July. The gardens were planted in June with winter squash and a soup bean mixture that will store well, too. With its status as a Master Gardener project, the Mitzvah Garden was able to obtain hot pepper and herb plants from the Ozaukee Master Gardeners at no charge.

Recycling garden materials has increased self-reliance in our garden. We employ a technique called straw bale gardening; the plants are grown in bales



that slowly compost yet provide a rich growing medium. We incorporate the composted straw into our soil garden beds, which brings many nutrients to the soil for future planting.

Last summer, the Chop Shop received four donations from the CBINT Garden. The children attending the summer camp at the shul even helped harvest vegetables. Come visit the garden this summer; it is a wonderful place to sit and enjoy summer weather. We welcome donations from congregant gardens, as well!
