A common question people ask me after each fall concert is "How are you going to top that next year?" I take it as a compliment and as a fun challenge, but the truth is, my goal is never to top a concert, but to produce a musical experience that will be

meaningful to the audience and to me regardless of what came before it. Throughout all the various formats (small ensemble, large chorus with chamber orchestra, fully staged theater, etc.) and styles (cantorial, musical theater, blue grass, etc.) I have always wanted to produce a musical tribute to Israel. And if ever it was the right year to do it, it's now.

Israel is always in our hearts, but especially this year after the violent attacks of October 7. We also view with concern the attacks on Israel's very right to exist and defend itself – internationally, and right here in Milwaukee, on college campuses, and on the floor of the county legislature. And, sadly, in the current climate, engaging in debate rarely results in anything other than further inflaming the situation.

On the flip side, we find resolve when we create opportunities to strengthen our own connection with Israel. And I can think of no better opportunity than through music and song.

On Sunday, September 15, at 4 p.m., I am excited to present **Shalom Al Yisrael** – Peace Over Israel, a musical tribute to the Jewish homeland. Joining me will be two amazing friends and colleagues. **Cantor Laurie Akers** of Chicago is a nationally acclaimed singer and composer whose beautiful voice and warm presence make her a fan favorite wherever she performs. **Hazzan Rabbi Luis Cattan** of NYC

grew up in Uruguay and brings an unparalleled passion and energy to Jewish music, with a unique blend of Ashkenazi and Sephardi influences. Together, we will share a mix of old favorites to sing along with as well as lesser known gems that will touch the soul.

As always, the fall concert is the premiere fundraising event for the synagogue. The past several years, the concert has raised \$20,000. This year, we would like to reach a new level of generosity and are aiming for \$25,000-\$30,000. The Dark Side of the Moon *from Beata Abraham*



If you like extremes, you're going to love the Hebrew month of Av and the emotional whiplash it brings with it. Even with our God-given, patented Jewish fortitude, it's a lot.

Av launches with the holiday of *Tisha B'Av*, and we descend

into the deepest depths of sorrow as we mourn the catastrophic loss of both of the Temples, as well as a multitude of other devastating Jewish events. Then, only six days after we have connected with our inner melancholy by fasting, sitting on the floor, and abstaining from all that might distract us from mourning, arrives one of the most joyous dates in the Jewish calendar; *Tu B'Av*. Following the heartbreak of *Tisha B'av*, we barely have time to reach an emotional equilibrium before it is *Tu B'av* and we are meant to ascend to the loftiest heights by tapping into our joy and our deeply ingrained fondness for matchmaking. An excellent reminder that no matter how much sorrow we experience, a reason for jubilation is always right around the corner.

The origin story of *Tu B'av*, the 15th day of the month of Av is intriguing.

The ancient celebrations of *Tu B'Av* are described in the *Mishnah (Taanit 4:8)* where Rabban Shimon ben Gamliel is quoted as saying:

"There were no days as joyous for the Jewish people as the 15th of Av and Yom Kippur. On these days, the daughters of Jerusalem would go out in white clothes, which each woman borrowed from another... so as not to embarrass one who did not have her own white garments... The daughters of Jerusalem would go out and dance in the vineyards."

The women would call out to the young men watching as they danced, saying:

'No matter how much sorrow we experience, a reason for jubilation is always right around the corner.'

"Young man, please lift up your eyes and see what you choose for yourself for a wife! Do not set your eyes toward beauty, but set your eyes toward a good family." This holiday gets bonus points for elevating dignity and shunning superficiality.

Tu B'Av is not only a lovely and festive annual matchmaking opportunity. The 15th of Av was also associated with many happy events in ancient Jewish history that occurred on the day (*Taanit 30b*).

Tu B'Av is the anniversary of a peculiar-to-our-modern-ears milestone. Due to the sins of the spies who had been sent to report on the Promised Land only to return with a harrowing account that incited a panic in the Israelites, for the duration of their time wandering in the desert, Israelites dug graves for themselves in which they slept every *Tisha B'Av* with the knowledge that it might be their last slumber on this earth. And, indeed, every *Tisha B'Av*, a large portion did not wake up the following day.

In the 40th year of wandering, the 15,000 who had remained from the desert generation went to sleep in the graves they had dug for themselves, and were astonished to wake up the next day. Thinking they had mistaken the date, they continued sleeping in the graves each night until they reached *Tu B'Av* and saw a full moon. Only then did they understand that they would enter the Land of Israel with the new generation. So unworthy of God's mercy did these 15,000 Israelites feel, that it took them an entire week to process that God had forgiven them and that the 40-year death decree was finally at an end.

And if those reasons aren't enough to make you want to rejoice on this day, it was on the 15th of Av that King Jeroboam, an exceptionally nefarious ruler of the Northern Kingdom of Israel, had his roadblocks removed, allowing people to resume their pilgrimages into Jerusalem.

In modern Israel, *Tu B'Av* gets a fair

amount of the attention it deserves. Often it is celebrated by sending a bouquet of flowers to the one you love, romantic songs being played on the radio, and glorious outdoor, evening parties against the spectacular Israeli landscape (yes, this is another reason to make *Aliya* immediately). It is also a popular day to hold Jewish weddings.

We can all agree that today there really aren't enough young maidens dancing in

vineyards wearing each other's white dresses, reminding their suitors to focus on their inner beauty, but that is ok. The Zohar teaches that for us to connect to a holiday's unique "light," we must engage in specific actions. Not so on *Tu B'Av*, when there are no rules or restrictions and the "light" appears and connects with us regardless of our actions. On *Tu B'Av* we celebrate simply by understanding the special meaning of this day. That is all we have to do.

At this writing, the garden is just getting going but there's already lots to share!! The fall-planted garlic is now ready. The initial harvest of five plants shows that the garlic is fully grown, and we can make space for other plants in their place.

Watermelon and cucumber will happily fill in the now-vacant real estate. Lettuce will be part of the first donation, along with the garlic, basil, and sage. Tiny Butternut Squash is appearing on the vines, as well as our first Berkeley Pink Tie Dye tomatoes.

eating last year's beans prompted building a structure to protect the current plants. So far so good ... we have lots of plants maturing and few being eaten.

For me the Mitzvah Garden creates not just habitat for plants but for sharing and collaboration. It feels good when Janet and I share duties and knowledge. And then Tikkun Ha-Ir in turn helps those who can benefit from the food. Next month, there will most certainly be more to share!!

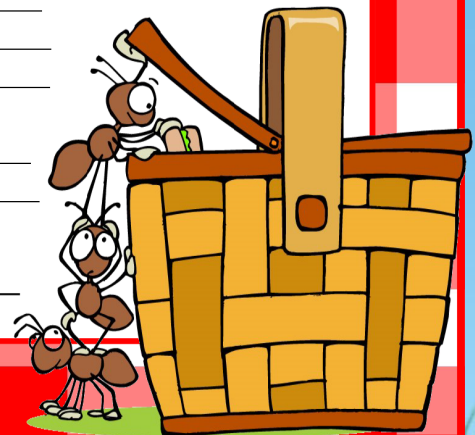

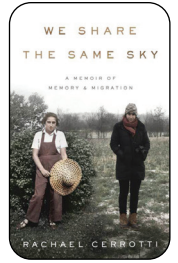

Renewal or Rededication? *from Rabbi Joel Alter*



This past spring, with 14 months left in my rabbinic contract, I advised the CBINT Board of my desire to remain at our congregation beyond July 2025. At the same time, the Board, informed by the extensive feedback you

gave through its survey, and other means, to learn your will, voted to invite me to continue as rabbi. A process is now underway to establish the terms of the contract that will realize our shared desire.

The months since that milestone have been among the most intense in my tenure. On the one hand, I feel a wee bit like “Sally Field” at the 1984 Oscars. (I date myself!!) On the other hand, and this is the heart of it, I feel like I’ve just emerged from *Ne’ilah* at Yom Kippur. When we emerge from *Ne’ilah*, we know who we need to be in the new year based upon the season’s intense reflection on who we have been. Even as we eagerly tuck into our kugel, the break fast meal is a sober moment of rededication. For all the intensity of the day just ended come *Ne’ilah* each year, it’s that moment *after* when it all must come together.

I feel enormously lucky to lead our beautiful community. Living Jewishly is about infinite opportunities to raise up the everyday toward the sacred. As a congregational rabbi, these opportunities come at every turn. Now with an individual, now with a family, now in the shul school, now with a bar or bat mitzvah student, now with the minyannaires, now with an adult education class, now with the congregation at large, now with the Milwaukee Jewish community, now with 7th graders from a Lutheran school, now with a conversion candidate... The curiosity, intelligence, eagerness, gratitude, generosity, good humor (and even not so good humor, Jay Miller), and

creativity – the *menschlekhkeit* of the CBINT community touches me.

My choice to continue, together with the congregation’s choice to retain me as its leader, creates new opportunities to lift up the everyday toward the sacred. That’s why the real work begins now.

“Renewal” doesn’t feel right to describe this moment. I’m no longer the new rabbi in town. Other rabbis in town are newer. And we’re no longer “just coming out of Covid.” The ravages of Covid, though, are plainly evident in our changed patterns of participation and attendance. Rather than calling this leadership decision a renewal, which might suggest that

we’re starting over fresh, we recognize that we come to this moment with the benefit of our history together. That’s why I’m grateful that the feedback process generated hard data about what the congregation is thinking and feeling, wanting and needing, grateful and hoping for. And yes, frustrated by and disappointed about, too. It’s *all* good data.

Essential information.

I know that CBINT has to organize itself as a community of purpose. Sacred purpose. In worship. In learning. In caring. In Chesed. In serving – within our community and beyond our walls. CBINT is passionate in its love and concern for Israel. Fierce and wise in its pride in the face of antisemitism. Our Board has convened multiple high stakes committees to strengthen our organization financially, and I’m excited about their fateful discussions now underway. I know that Conservative Judaism’s love of tradition and learning, together with its fearless embrace of modernity, is a recipe for meaning and belonging. I know that all members of shul households have a place at CBINT, and that means that our community, as a passionately and traditionally Jewish one, must recognize and embrace its multifaith character. I know that Hazzan Stein and I, separately and together, are shaping services that open new paths for voice, heart, spirit,

and mind. I know that our religious school is in a season of reinvention, finding powerful new ways to build literacy and love in being, and knowing, Jewish.

I know all this, and much more, about our community, and so do you. But we have to talk and dream and argue and prioritize and choose – together. Your leadership decision,

then, initiates a season of rededication, rather than renewal. Who are we? What do we need to be? Where are we going? And how are we getting there? This is what will occur in listening sessions to be rolled out over the course of the fall. I'm excited to articulate my vision. I'm even more excited to learn yours.
